Remembrance Sunday is a time when the country and the city of Liverpool come together to remember those who have paid the ultimate sacrifice in two world wars. It is also a time to remember those injured and bereaved in recent conflict.

Due to the ongoing health pandemic, our traditional annual Service of Remembrance, the dedication and march past will not take place this year. This is deeply disappointing for all concerned and it is not a decision that has been taken lightly.

After extensive consultation and careful consideration, it was decided to hold a reduced virtual service, which will be made available to the public on Remembrance Sunday. In line with the Royal British Legion, we ask that if you are involved in any remembrance activity please abide by the guidelines currently in place, and perhaps consider pausing for the twominute silence in your home or on your doorstep.

I would like to take this opportunity to praise and thank our present military who have played such a vital role during the pandemic, many who are reservists and key workers, or are working for our National Health Service.

These arrangements will not, in any way, diminish our respect, reverence for the sacrifice, and service of so many. Our living rooms, gardens and doorways will become places to pause and contemplate the importance of our remembrance. In homes across the nation, let us stiffen, rise to attention, lower our gaze and think of those who have answered the call to protect our loved ones, today and throughout history.
